## 31<sup>st</sup> Interfaith Holocaust Service on at 7:30 pm on Friday, May 6

During the Holocaust Service, Alice Eichenbaum will recall her experiences living in Bulgaria during World War II, and contrast those of her husband who survived the Lodz (Poland) Ghetto, and concentration camps, including Auschwitz and Manthausen.

Alice's son, Howard Eichenbaum, is a temple member.

Rabbi Susan Abramson of Temple Shalom Emeth said that the service is held to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day (Yom Hashoah), and to memorialize the people who died during World War II, and "to never forget."

She added, "We keep alive the story of the Holocaust so it will never happen again, and so we can be mindful of how much bigotry and hatred there is in our world today, not just anti-Semitism."

## Second Annual Police Chief Shabbat Service at 7:30 pm on Friday, May 13

Middlesex District Attorney Marian Ryan will speak at the Police Chief Service on May 13, and will be joined by law enforcement officials who recently returned from an Anti Defamation League (ADL) training mission in Israel. Ryan was one of the mission participants.

The one-week visit to Israel was designed to educate local law enforcement on how to better predict, prevent, and respond to terrorism, now and in the future. The ADL has sponsored the trip for the past six years.
