What is the Wild and Scenic River System?

Passed in 1968, the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act established a program to permanently protect selected free-flowing rivers. Those rivers

deemed to possess outstandingly remarkable scenic, geological, recreational, ecological, historical or cultural resource values are included in the Wild and Scenic River System. To date, over 11,000 river miles have been designated, including such well known names as the Snake, the Klamath, and the Rio Grande.

The Sudbury, Assabet and Concord Wild and Scenic River is one of seven designated rivers in New England.
